Imagine you are in grade five. You have two siblings, you are interested in the Harry Potter series of books and movies and you are keen to create delicious delights in the kitchen...but best of all you have a mentor that comes to your school for one hour a week just to be with you. You may think most of this description personifies a lot of ten year olds, but the difference is, this one is part of the In-School Mentoring program at Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Calgary.

You have just been introduced to Janessa, a bubbly young person with an unbelievable future ahead of her. Janessa has been matched to her mentor, Jenna, for two years and together they have proven that friendship knows no age boundaries. Whether it's playing a board game, or baking and decorating a batch of cookies, this dynamic duo share a lot in common. "We are both interested in art," explains Jenna, a Psychology major at the University of Calgary, "We both have similar interests in movies and books. Usually I let her pick our weekly activity but I offer suggestions." Last week it was crafts and games, next week will be baking.

Even though Janessa might not know everything now, what she does know, she knows well. Take checkers for example. As the two carefully manouver though a close game, Janessa describes how she is trying to teach her younger sister how to play and goes on to highlight her numerous checkers success stories. "I used to beat my uncle at checkers all the time," Janessa says smiling, as she strategizes her next big move, "King me."

With a game win under her belt, Janessa quickly moves from one topic of discussion to another. Halloween. Cookies. Cats. Trampolines. As Jenna carefully listens to Janessa's detailed account of the dragons Harry Potter had to overthrow, Jenna notes the difference she has seen in her Mentee since they were matched last year: "Janessa is more interested in trying new things now... she has come out of her shell. Being an In-School Mentor has given me the chance to be her friend, to be here for her and to make her feel good about herself."

Bringing mutual respect and compatibility to their match, Jenna and Janessa are a special In-School Mentoring pair. "The friendship that Jenna has offered to Janessa is what makes this match so incredible," notes Marcia Dupuis, the pair's Mentoring Coordinator, "Jenna makes Janessa feel like a priority in her life." And a priority she is... because what started off as a meeting of strangers has turned into a beautiful friendship.

At the same time as Janessa is enjoying having a new friend to share stories and experiments with, Jenna is embracing the opportunity to share one hour of her week with a young person, while focusing on something other than school. "Ever since I turned 18 I always wanted to volunteer- being an In-School Mentor has given me the chance to gain another friend, someone to hang out with... Just an hour a week to have fun." When Jenna isn't at the school with Janessa, she keeps busy as a full-time student in her fourth year at the University of Calgary. After graduation in 2007, Jenna looks forward to a year off before starting a Masters program with a focus on counselling. Additionally, Jenna spends her time volunteering at the Distress Centre and is looking forward to the upcoming year when she hopes to become a coach for the Special Olympics.

As an In-School Mentor since 2005, Jenna is happy to be making a difference in Janessa's life, one visit at a time. "The most memorable get together for me happened last year at the beginning of our third visit- I saw Janessa and she ran over and gave me a hug." This is a ritual that has carried on into this year- Janessa can't help but hug Jenna with zealous excitement as she looks forward to their hour together. Perhaps the most important question is this: what does Janessa think is the best part of having a mentor? "I don't know everything," explains Janessa, as she looks to her Mentor, Jenna, who she thinks might just have some insight into a few of the things her ten years of life experience have yet to teach.

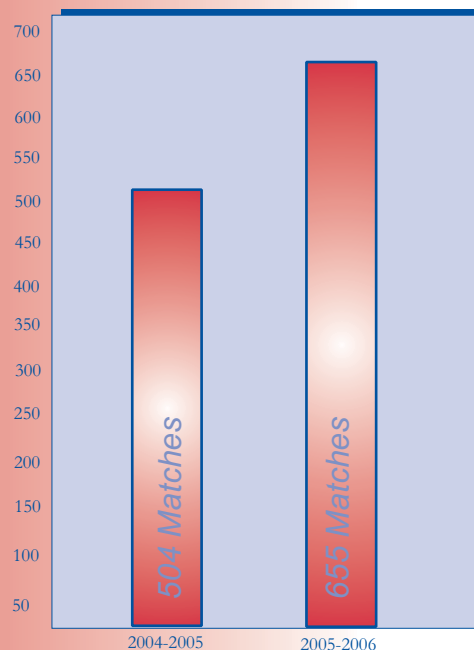

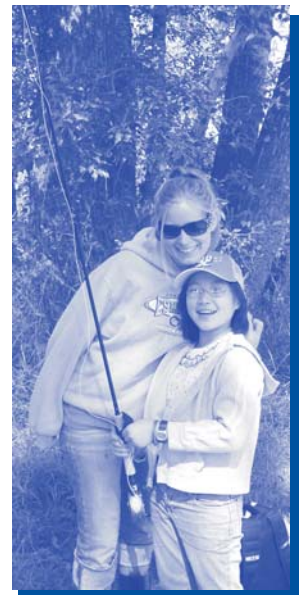
